The project is led by Special Educational Needs. Somerset Expertise (sen.se), with the support of charity Young Somerset. Sen.se is a partnership between special schools and specialist provision within Somerset.

The shop gives young people valuable work experience and skills for life.

World Autism Awareness Week - four areas of difference

It's World Autism Awareness Week next week - 1-7 April - so what does being on the Autistic spectrum mean? Every child and young person on the spectrum will have a range of abilities and needs within each of these areas:

1. Social understanding:

Differences in understanding social behaviour and the feelings of others which informs the development of friendships and relationships.

2. Differences in perceiving sensory information:

Hypo (low sensitivity), hyper (high sensitivity), touch, sight, hearing, smell, taste, vestibular inner ear (balance), proprioceptive (body awareness)

3. Interests and information processing:

Differences in perception, planning, understanding concepts, generalising, predicting, managing transitions, passions for interests and ability to absorb auditory or spoken information.

4. Communication:

Differences in understanding and expressing communication and language, with skills

ranging from individuals who are highly articulate, to others who may be non–verbal. Good language skills may mask a deep level of misunderstanding.

These four areas of difference create high levels of stress and anxiety, and this can have a profound impact on an individual's performance and behaviour. For more information contact JDennisMinns@somerset.gov.uk

New building will support journey into adulthood

Pupils and staff at Selworthy school are celebrating after a project to revamp an empty building and turn it into a new 6th form centre was launched. Developer Willmott Dixon is carrying out the work at no cost and suppliers have provided the materials as a donation. It's all part of a commitment to give something back to the community.

The new centre will have a common room, changing places WC, classrooms, café and a flat to enable students to prepare for independent living.

The new facility complements Willmott Dixon's development of the new £9million Hazelbrook Campus at the school which will create another 100 places for pupils with a range of Special Educational Needs and/or Disabilities.
