There are lots of ways you can enhance your child's learning at home!





You could research any interesting aspect of Ancient Egyptian and Ancient Greek life and create a fact poster.

You could explore Ancient Egyptian and Ancient Greek recipes and do some cooking together and then record your recipe to share with the class.

Children often like making things so any collage or model based around the Ancient Egyptians and Ancient Greeks where the children have to research first to find out specific details is a lovely half term activity to do together.

Watch any relevant television programmes including Horrible Histories and any suitable BBC documentaries.

Visit Somerton library and explore their collection of Ancient Egyptian and Ancient Greek non-fiction books. The library needs our support.

Start researching and gathering items of clothing to create your Ancient Egyptian costume for the topic outcome day. No need to buy something new online - just be creative with what you have already.

Find your own Ancient Greek myth and produce a cartoon strip to retell it.



In Topic

What are ancient legacies and civilisations?
Who were the Ancient Egyptians, how and where did they live?

Our Learning Journey





Our topic will begin with a visit to the Tutankhamun Exhibition and Mummies Exhibition in Dorchester where the children will have a talk from the education officer who runs the museum, tour both exhibits and have a chance to sketch the artefacts and Tutankhamun treasures discovered by Howard Carter.



We will be studying what everyday life was like for the Ancient Egyptians and Ancient Greeks — particularly focusing on homes, clothing, work and food and how it differs from life in 21st Century Britain.



The children will enjoy the exciting gruesomeness of learning about the process of mummification and the beliefs about the afterlife that the Egyptians held. Furthermore, we will be looking at the lives of the pharaohs, their pyramids and tombs.



Both civilisations have left great legacies on our lives today and so we will be bringing our studies together focusing on the influence on our country and the wider world.



The studies will conclude on our topic outcome day on Wednesday 27th November when we will be dressing up as Egyptians and experiencing a range of exciting Egyptian (or Greek) activities which may include Egyptian food, music and a selection of games and art projects.
